## Colossians 3:16

Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God.



Who is God? What is He like? Can He be known? These are the most important questions in the universe. The good news is God has answered these questions by revealing Himself through His attributes. The most important thing we can do in the universe is grow in our knowledge of God. We have been created by God to know God. For the season of Lent our devotions will be on knowing God through His attributes.

#### **Greatness**

God's incomparable greatness shines brightly in the Scripture. It can be compared to a star shining high in the heavens, which, on the one hand, we can certainly see and be in awe of, though, on the other hand, we cannot see exhaustively. This is because God's greatness includes the reality that He is without limit. In other words, He is infinite. In fact, God is the greatest conceivable being! Since God's being is infinite, all of attributes are infinite. After all, God is perfect in Himself and in all His ways. So, since God is infinite in power, He is omnipotent. Since He is infinite in His relation to time, He is eternal. When it comes to His relation to space, God's infinity means that He is omnipresent. What an amazing God we serve! How appropriate is it, then, when Jeremiah says, "There is none like you, O Lord; you are great, and your name is great in might" (Jer. 10:6).

God's greatness teaches us a few things. First, it teaches us humility. God's limitlessness highlights our limitedness, our smallness in comparison to Him. It's a helpful reminder to us that He is certainly worthy to be trusted in all that He tells us in His word and in all of the providences He sends our way. Why wouldn't we trust a God infinite in knowledge and wisdom? Secondly, God's infinity gives us reason to rejoice. Given the infinite qualitative distinction between us and God, how wonderful is it that He has graciously revealed Himself to us? How else could we know such a God unless He first moved to make Himself known? Not only that, but God has sent His only Son to us, His perfect image, that we might have salvation and that we might come to more fully know Him and His will for us. "No one has ever seen God; the only God, who is at the Father's side, he has made him known" (Jn. 1:18). Finally, His greatness reminds us that He is greatly to be praised. He alone is highly exalted above all earthly powers, indeed, over all the things of this world. His name alone is to be glorified, in our hearts, in our mouths, and in our lives.

# **Scripture on God's Greatness**

Genesis 18:14 Is anything too hard for the Lord?

**2 Chronicles 2:4-6** <sup>4</sup>Behold, I am about to build a house for the name of the Lord my God and dedicate it to him for the burning of incense of sweet spices before him, and for the regular arrangement of the showbread, and for burnt offerings morning and evening, on the Sabbaths and the new moons and the appointed feasts of the Lord our God, as ordained forever for Israel. <sup>5</sup> The house that I am to build will be great, for our God is greater than all gods. <sup>6</sup> But who is able to build him a house, since heaven, even highest heaven, cannot contain him? Who am I to build a house for him, except as a place to make offerings before him?
